The course "Language and Thought" is part of the bachelor's in psychology and the Dual Degree in Criminology and Psychology. It is a compulsory course with a total of 6 ECTS.

In Campus Modality

If any instance of plagiarism is detected in submitted activities, the activity will be graded with a 0 and considered failed in the ordinary call. Late submissions are not allowed and will be graded with a 0, unless properly justified. These activities must be resubmitted during the extraordinary call, under the same regulations.

Lastly, to pass the course in the ordinary call, a minimum attendance of 50% is required. Absence justifications do not cancel out recorded absences under any circumstance.
