2. INTRODUCTION

The subject area "Primary Community Care Nursing" introduces second year students of the Bachelor's Degree in Nursing to the work of nurses at the primary health care level, focusing on healthcare facility settings and primary care teams.

This subject further explores nursing care in the community, with respect to Public Health and other areas of knowledge covered in the first year.

The aim is for students to know and understand the role of the nurse in this area of health in healthcare facilities, the homes of individuals and families, institutions and associations of the community and, ultimately, where people's lives take place.

The learning outcomes focus on understanding the conceptual and organisational framework of primary health care, the acquisition of knowledge and skills in direct nursing care in the various forms of individual and family care (as a core community group), based on the methodology of the nursing process, the portfolio of primary care services and health programmes, and the acquisition of skills to plan health education aimed at groups.

3. SKILLS AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

Basic skills (CB, by the acronym in Spanish):

- CB2: Students know how to apply their knowledge to their work or vocation professionally and have the skills that are usually demonstrated by forming and defending opinions and solving problems within their study area.
- CB3: Students have the ability to gather and interpret relevant data (normally within their area
 of study) to form opinions which include reflecting on relevant social, scientific or ethical
 matters.



General skills (CG, by the acronym in Spanish):

- CG2: Plan and provide nursing care directed at individuals, families or groups, geared towards effective results for health and assess their impact through clinical care practice guidelines, which describe the processes by which a health problem is diagnosed, treated or cared for.
- CG9: Promote healthy lifestyles and self-care, supporting the maintenance of preventive and therapeutic behaviours.
- CG11: Establish effective communication with patients, families, social groups and colleagues, and promote health education.

Cross-curricular skills (CT, by the acronym in Spanish):

- CT3: Contribute actively in work teams, assuming shared responsibilities.
- CT4: Apply effective communication strategies in professional practice.

European skills:

- CUE1: Independently diagnose the necessary nursing care using theory and medical knowledge, and plan, organise and administer nursing care when treating patients on the basis of the knowledge and skills acquired in accordance with point 6(a), (b) and (c), in order to improve professional practice.
- CUE3: Empower individuals, families and groups to take responsibility for healthy lifestyles and self-care based on the knowledge and skills acquired in accordance with paragraph 6(a) and (b).
- CUE5: Independently give advice, guidance and provide support to people in need of care, as well as those close to them.

Specific skills (CE, by the acronym in Spanish):

- CE12: Know and apply the principles underpinning comprehensive nursing care, applying the
 nursing process as a scientific methodology in the care process to manage, assess and provide
 care to individuals, families and the community, providing and ensuring the well-being, quality
 and safety of the people cared for.
- CE13: Ability to describe the fundamentals of primary health care and the nursing activities
 carried out to provide comprehensive nursing care to individuals, families and the
 community, understanding the role, activities and cooperative attitude required from
 professionals in a primary health care team and promoting the involvement of individuals,
 families and groups in their health-illness process.
